Capable of hosting thousands of delegates or guests, the Aarhus Congress Center may be the most important venue in Jutland for large national and international meetings, conferences, trade fairs and everything in between.

hat used to be called the Scandinavian Congress
Center in Denmark's second largest city is now rebranded as the Aarhus Congress Center – a celebration of the city's fast-growing international importance.

Located in the heart of the city, the Aarhus Congress Center and the adjoining 234-room Radisson Blu Scandinavia Hotel, Aarhus, neighbor the City Hall, the Aarhus Concert Hall and the world-class art museum ARoS.

The congress hall is among the

most flexible facilities in the meeting and events industry. It transforms seamlessly from a 1,600-seat conference room to a 4,100-spectator concert forum, or from a 1,400-guest banquet venue into an 1,800-square meter exhibition floor, or even a combined space for launching new cars. Surrounded by dinner tables and stages for AV presentations and live music, and catering by its own fantastic kitchen, the venue has plenty of surprises up its sleeve.

Denmark's second city, but a metropolis in its own right.

Still, the city's infrastructure is undergoing massive development, further enhancing Aarhus' chances for hosting even more international meetings and events in the future. Recently, SAS has opened new direct, one-stop routes to Aarhus international airport from Oslo, Stockholm, Munich and Malaga. And Nice, Mallorca and Split opened during the summer. EasyJet is also starting to fly Aarhus-Berlin this autumn.

Hotel capacity is increasing to more than 1,250 rooms in the heart of the city by 2020, thanks to new projects by Comwell, Scandic, Arp-Hansen and other hotels. And, not to forget, the opening of the first Radisson RED branded lifestyle hotel in Scandinavia in 2019.
